
We are seeking a Vicar who will lead us in our call to follow Christ's commission to make disciples of all nations and peoples and to embody the Revelation vision.

There is a strong South Asian, African and Caribbean heritage in Southall, reflected in our church family at St John's. We believe diversity reflects God's kingdom and we are committed to being part of a wider global community. Our church membership and attendance is strong, and several hundred more people feel part of St John's and travel to attend our seasonal and celebratory events.

St John's has a long and distinguished history of championing diversity in worship, placing a strong emphasis on community, fellowship and intergenerational relationship.

We believe there is a real opportunity for St John's to build on this foundation to find imaginative and meaningful ways to bring the love of Jesus and his kingdom, extending our reach beyond Southall.

Celebrating the Joy of Our Faith through Musical Worship







We love our continuing focus on a variety of worship styles (including the contemplative as much as the exuberant), and more intercultural events and worship.

Intercultural **musical** worship is an important part of life at St John's, and we are keen to see this area develop further. Our style is **contemporary**, with an all-age worship group playing guitar, keyboard, bass and drums. We sing a range of modern and traditional songs.

We embrace music and song in multiple languages, reflecting our diverse backgrounds and unified by our faith. Embracing the rich heritage of our Asian communities we also sometimes use tabla, Indian harmonium (or baja) and on occasion, sitar. For example, we have sung songs in Hindi and Farsi with an English translation.

a warm welcome & open to All

We love that our church offers inclusive fellowship with fantastic **food and hospitality** (breakfasts, and refreshments after a service).

We want to continue to strengthen relationships through more social activities. We are a welcoming and open church community that is accessible for all, especially the differently abled and those with additional needs. We want each and everyone to know how much they are loved and valued.



Our commitment to SEN inclusion offers safe spaces, with a creche for under 3s, and more recently, for children with special educational needs or disability (SEN/D).

We have multiple, committed operational teams of people with a broad range of expertise and skills who work collectively behind the scenes to ensure the seamless delivery of our different ministries and services:

For our services, we project the order of service, hymns, liturgy, and worship lyrics on screens, supported by a dedicated audiovisual and technical team.

WE ARE SEEKING A VICAR

- 1. Who has a range of **leadership** and **nurturing** skills, and experience in **developing** a team of clergy, lay leaders, operational and ministry teams.
- 2. Who has effective **communication** and interpersonal skills, capable of articulating St John's mission and vision as an Intercultural Resource Church. They will help foster relationships across Southall, encouraging a sense of unity and shared purpose.
- 3. Who can offer biblical teaching and training which connects to a diverse intergenerational church community
 firmly rooted in God's word, open to the work of the Holy
 Spirit and can explain what the Bible teaches
- 4. Who inspires others through their faith in Jesus Christ, and will explore ways to further nurture and deepen intercultural worship, witness, fellowship, and community within the life of the church.
- 5. Who will oversee the equipping of **disciples** from all backgrounds through the training, equipping and encouraging of both ordained and lay leaders, some of whom may lead new congregations and plants
- 6. Who can develop our vision for community engagement and ministry, to develop our missional activities, using more opportunities to create links to the wider community and spread God's kingdom.

Church Buildings & Community Complex





We love that our church is committed to climate change and seeking to protect God's gift of our green world and is working towards a Silver Eco-Church Award.

The church is well located in the local community, both geographically and relationally, with a strong local presence, and trusted by faith and civic leaders.

Completed in 1909, the church building is a hidden **gem** with a beautifully reordered interior. It is a welcoming and flexible space for worship services and community events. The St John's Church Centre is popular as a **community space**, widely used for commercial and private hires as well as to our core midweek church ministries.

A commitment to climate change is demonstrated by our long term support and links to our mission partners, A Rocha, part of a global family conservation of organisations working together to live out God's calling to care for creation and to equip others to do likewise. St John's is aspiring to achieve a silver award as part of **Eco-Church** scheme the nationally organised by A Rocha UK.

Just around the corner on King Street, St John's also owns an old chapel building, and a former home of St John's. Closed pending significant renovations, we hope to restore St John's Old Church as a Christian run youth centre and community ministry hub.







Children & Youth

We love that our church has always had a strong emphasis on young people and children and is committed to deepening this further. We want to continue to invest in our youth, to grow new leaders and to further explore how that might be expressed through a youth congregation, worship, discipleship and leadership.

At St. John's, our mission is to see our children and young people become committed disciples of Jesus Christ.



Children's Ministry (Ages 3-11): Our Sunday morning sessions welcome children aged 3-11, offering a variety of activities with arts and crafts, games, stories, and videos. We prioritise safeguarding and our sessions are designed to be accessible and inclusive, with resources and equipment for children with special educational needs and disabilities (SEN/D).

Youth Ministry (Ages 11-16): Our Sunday morning sessions for 11-16-year-olds are active and engaging. Many of our young people participate in the Youth Worship Group, with all age, youth-led services, and we have a strong team of volunteer helpers.

We aim to grow and strengthen our Children and Youth Ministry and are currently looking to appoint a full-time youth worker to support Friday Night youth sessions.

Crèche (Under 3): St. John's offers a crèche for children under 3, where they can play with toys and games during the service. Parents and carers can still hear the service while looking after their children.





Mid-Week Groups:

- Little Angels Toddler Group: Held every Thursday morning during term time, this group is for children aged 0-3 and their parents/carers. It's a wonderful opportunity to connect and build friendships in the community, while enjoying toys, crafts, snacks, Bible stories, and songs. The group attracts around 30 families per week.
- **Bumps and Babies:** Held on Thursday afternoons during term time, this session offers valuable health and baby care advice for expecting parents and those with newborns in a relaxing environment.
- **Messy Church:** Regularly hosted, Messy Church provides activities for primary school-aged children and fun for all families. Run by volunteers, it attracts around 80-100 children and their families from across the community, sharing the good news of Jesus.

These mid-week groups collectively strengthen our sense of community and engage with children and families within Southall and create a space for the community to engage with the life and faith of our church.

RESOURCE CHURCH & MISSION ZONE

We love that we are a resource church working at the heart of the "**Transforming** Southall and Hounslow" mission area of thirteen parishes.

St John's is designated as a **Resource Church** in the Episcopal Area of Willesden, due to its long history of training and equipping of church leaders through the work of our training arm, the **Kings Centre Southall**, and as a centre for mission and ministry within Southall.


Our building hosts the operational hub of the Bishop's Mission Order serving Southall and Hounslow, which has received a £2.7 million Strategic Development Fund award for the planting of fifteen new congregations over five years (2022-2027), with the training and equipping of sixty lay leaders and the discipleship of our churches to be both missional and to be quantifiably impactful in social enterprise, youth ministry and environmentally.














Ministry, Mission & Discipleship



We love that our church has a long history and a wide range of outreach in the local community.

Throughout the week we support different ministries for women whose first language is not English, children and young people, and senior citizens.

The church has a rich history in offering a wide range of outreach in the local community. The **English classes** for women have been running for over 30 years and continue to attract 30–50 women from outside the church who are looking for a safe space to learn English.

Complementing this is our **Women's Ministry**, which offers support, empowers women and affirms and encourages the leadership of women.

The church's ministry amongst **young families** over many years has engaged a large fringe of families from outside the church, which gives an opportunity to build relationships and share God's love in a relaxed and joyful way.

The church hosts a weekly **coffee morning** and an **over 60s** club, both of which draw in older church members as well as those from the wider community.





We can see opportunities for closer connections between the outreach and service ministries for the community and the worshipping life of the church. We have recently started a **Prayer-in-the-shops ministry**, and are connected to the local food bank and homeless ministries, run across multiple local churches. We would love to see the gospel continuing to be shared through these different ministries, and closer connections developed between the outreach into the community and the worshipping life of the church.

We host **The Table**, a weekly meal-based discipleship space for those coming from other faith backgrounds to explore more about Jesus and develop a greater understanding of what it means to be a Christian. We are keen to keep exploring new ways how God's love can be shared with the wider communities through these different ministries.



We love that our church has grown leaders and sent several to ordained **ministry training** over the last few years.

The church has hosted homegroups in the past, small groups in church and courses over Lent, including a recent course "the Bereavement Journey" about loss and suffering. We are seeking an additional focus on discipleship, for example by renewing our approach to small groups, encouraging prayer and fellowship midweek, and by hosting more faith-based courses.







We love the urban surroundings of Southall, the buzz of Old Southall and Broadway, the smell of spice and the infectious noise of **community** life.

The Vibe

Southall is a vibrant suburb in West London, known for its ethnic and religious diversity, expressed through shops, restaurants and places of worship that represent its mixed community. Historically, Southall is known for its very large South Asian community with communities from India, Pakistan, Sri Lanka and Afghanistan, alongside those from Somalia, Kenya and the Caribbean.

Southall and its people are a complex mix of paradoxes, for example with extreme wealth on display during Indian wedding baraats, and devotional generosity with food and water donated to all throughout Vaisakhi; alongside extreme poverty, and neglect.

The Place

St John's Church is based just off Kings Street, a mix of shops, restaurants and places of worship. The parish includes several mosques, Hindu and Sikh temples.

Many residents in our community live in older houses of varying quality, often shared by multiple families or generations. Housing remains a significant challenge, and we are seeing a growing number of unhoused people experiencing rough sleeping or sofa surfing.

The parish includes one high school and several primary schools, and the church has good relationships with all of these, with pupils regularly joining us for commemorative events such as Remembrance Day services, or Messy Church.

This rapidly changing area has also resulted in many new housing developments around the railway station, principally bringing new people to the community and presenting opportunities for engagement with those wishing to learn more about the Christian faith.

The influence of Southall's proximity to Heathrow is reflected in the network of local roads and public transport infrastructure which defines the surrounding area. Many in our community either retired from, work for or are connected to the airport.





Voices from St John's on Racial Justice

Historically, for a generation of our older **South Asian and African Caribbean church members** newly arrived in the 1960s, Southall was a gateway to a new life, and not one that was always welcoming.

The experiences of these communities resonated deeply with the news of George Floyd's murder and the stark disparities of COVID-19 with disproportionately high deaths among Black and Asian ethnicities. Along with a powerful sermon on racism, these elements catalysed the establishment of our **Faith**, **Race**, and **Culture** group.

Slowly, the group shared personal and painful experiences of racism, both within and outside the church, the impact on our individual faith journeys, and looked at how these issues could be addressed within the wider church. We have decided to focus on the following actions as we await the arrival of a new Vicar:

- 1.Invite speakers, with a background in **racial justice** to preach regularly at St John's;
- 2.Develop framed **guidance** and criteria for service preachers and ministry leads to actively support racial justice and inclusion themes; and
- 3. Explore ways to further nurture **intercultural** worship, fellowship, and community within the life of the church.



The Vicarage & Curate Accommodation

We love that the St John's Vicarage will soon be a home again: to our new vicar and their family.

The Vicarage

The St John's Vicarage has always been more than just brickwork and mortar and will offer the new vicar and their family a **welcoming** home as part of the St John's community. Situated at the rear of the church, this spacious home, built in 1929, is located on Church Avenue, where there is a generous amount of space for car parking.

Full of character, a large hallway leads to several reception and office rooms, together with a cloakroom, large kitchen and separate utility space. On the upper floors, there are **five bedrooms and two bathrooms**.

Patio doors lead to a large, secluded garden, with ample space and secure perimeters including a gate leading to the Church Centre. This is an amazing, green and quiet space at the heart of old Southall, and has been, with permission, regularly used for church BYO picnics, bbqs, PCC summer meet ups, and the occasional game of footie after a Sunday service.



The Curacy House

Acquired in 2013, a **three-bedroom**, semi-detached property. Located nearby on Ellison Gardens, this is an asset for St John's and has been a good source of revenue, in addition to providing a home to ordinands, curates and St John's mission partners over the years.

We have the heart space to hold both pain and sadness with joy and laughter knowing that to live the Christian life is about both. The deep sadness of the Cross and deep the joy of the resurrection.

- Our 2024 accounts are in the process of being examined and may have small changes at the point of being signed off.
- The Trustees have set a 2025 budget at £322,661. With an active and growing church the focus for 2025 is to invest in employed staff to support the volunteer base and the mission of the church.
- The 2024 combined value of assets, without liability, was £831,901, in December 2024. This includes a curacy house, investments and a cash balance of £382,213 (of which £19,358 is in the general fund, £69,244 designated and £293,611 restricted).
- St John's is supported by a PCC that is committed to ensuring financial transparency and takes very seriously its fiduciary responsibilities, with robust financial management and governance in place. In 2023 we were gifted a large legacy by one of our saints and we are currently in the process of deciding a fitting and appropriate use of this amazing gift.
